DELAWARE Glasgow: Goods stolen in home burglaries and recovered by state police will be on display this evening. The items were recovered during an investigation of a secondhand store in the Newark area. Investigators are asking people who have recently had items stolen to visit and bring copies of their police reports.

pistrict of columbia: The city allows private investors to pursue foreclosure on homes over unpaid tax bills, but many of the debts are less than \$500, a Washington Post investigation has found. Since 2005, investors have foreclosed on nearly 200 houses and are now working to take 1,200 more. The tax office recently stopped selling liens on debts of less than \$1,000 to help manage its caseload, officials said.

FLORIDA Orlando: Florida's four largest metropolitan areas rank below the national average in science and engineering jobs, according to figures from the U.S. Census. The Miami-Fort Lauderdale area had one of the lowest rates of science workers among the USA's largest cities at only 3.8% of the workforce.

GEORGIA Gainesville: The Georgia Historical Society has approved a historic marker to commemorate the deaths of dozens of young women in one of the USA's deadliest fires. The victims were killed when a tornado slammed into the Cooper Pants Factory and the building caught fire in 1936, killing between 40 to 125

IOWA Des Moines: Record high temperatures have returned to Iowa this week. Heat is expected to linger into today, with a projected recordhigh of 95 degrees. About a third of Iowa is in a severe drought, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor.

KANSAS Baldwin City: An exhibit featuring Bible illustrations and woodcuts dating to Medieval times is on display at Baker University. The Quayle Bible Collection exhibit, Illuminating the Bible: Woodcuts and Engravings, is open from 1 to 4 p.m. local time Saturday and Sunday through August 2014 in the Helen Foresman Spencer wing of the Collins Library on the Baker campus. A reception is planned for Sept. 19.

KENTUCKY Danville: A \$250 million donation that would have been among the largest gifts to higher education in U.S. history has been withdrawn from Centre College, officials said Monday.

LOUISIANA Shreveport: Two police officers are suing the city and its police chief for using an illegal "quota" system for measuring traffic stops, misdemeanor and felony arrests, and contacts people asking for ballots but walking away without casting them in El Paso and Pueblo counties. He said the missing ballots could be used as a reason to challenge the results of the election.

MASSACHUSETTS Westminster:

Police have identified the local man who died when his car went off the road and landed in a pond over the weekend. The driver and lone occupant, Richard Ahlin, 83, was pronounced dead at the scene.

MICHIGAN Lansing: The state's \$174 million early education budget pays for 48,000 children to attend preschool, a boost over the 32,000 served by last year's \$109 million budget.

MINNESOTA St. Cloud: The Greater Minnesota Regional Parks and Trails Commission will recommend how lawmakers should spend parks and trails money outside of the Twin Cities metro area.

MISSISSIPPI Jackson: The state's record for the heaviest alligator has fallen again with the catch of a 741.5-pounder in the backwater of the Mississippi River near Port Gibson on Sunday morning. The Clarion-Ledger reported that it also tied the record for longest alligator at 13 feet, 6.5 inches.

MISSOURI St. Louis: Four of the world's top chess players are here this week for a \$170,000 invitational tournament bankrolled by prominent political donor Rex Sinquefield. The roundrobin field of grandmasters includes world
